

So, where does the problem come from? KITTENS!!!

Total Unclaimed Animals (Excluding Kittens) and Total Unclaimed Kittens







Pullman City Code allows cats to roam freely, but officers will respond to injured or sick strays. WCHS will admit cats that are sick, injured, pregnant, nursing, or under 6 months of age.
